Down to Business..... Parish Meeting

The Parish meeting in March was much better attended than in previous years, with 26 people present. Reports were available from 12 village organizations and 10 representatives spoke briefly about their organizations. There was discussion of the Hethersett development plans and the recent flooding at Mill Rd. Many thanks to Chris and Mary Starr for providing refreshments.

Flooding

Heavy rain in late February/early March caused serious flooding at Mill Rd. The Parish Council worked actively with South Norfolk District Council and the Norfolk County Highways Department and eventually the cause was traced to blockages in the pipeline that runs in the gardens of houses along Great Melton Road. Highways spent £2000 on partially clearing the blockages and the flood subsided. South Norfolk District Council has written to all the land owners and has suggested improvements that need to be made to ditches and pipes to avoid a repetition of the problem.

It is now evident that in many places around the village there are ditches and ponds that have been piped or filled in. This means that there is less capacity to absorb heavy rainfall and requires the pipes to be well maintained in order to avoid flooding in other places. Many people seem unaware of pipes under their properties and have manholes now covered by lawns and bushes. It may be a good idea to check your property deeds!

Litter Pick

A very special thank you to everyone who helped with the litter pick and playground maintenance on the 27th of March. The next litter pick will be in October so watch out for details in the next newsletter.

Proposed Development at Hethersett

The Greater Norwich Development Partnership (GNDP) has suggested that 1000 new homes should be built at Hethersett by 2026. However, the GNDP plan has not yet been adopted and in mid March a development company conducted a consultation exercise that lead to plans for 1140 homes being put forward. A year ago the GNDP were considering options for up to 7000 new homes at Hethersett and Little Melton Parish Council actively campaigned against this on the grounds that it would lead to massive increases in traffic through Little Melton. The Parish Council has much the same concerns about the current proposals, as the new houses and business units would be built around Little Melton Road and Burnthouse Lane.

The Parish Council accepts that some development is inevitable and will campaign for measures to minimize car use and to divert traffic away from Little Melton. Dualling of the A11, large developments at Cringleford, Wymondham and Attleborough will all lead to increased traffic at Thickthorn with the consequent danger that Little Melton will become a rat run. The developers have taken heed of many of the suggestions made by Little Melton Parish Council but we think that more needs to be done in order to stop Little Melton becoming the access route to the new domestic and commercial developments.

Primary School update

The School Christmas was as hectic as ever, as well as appearing on BBC Newsround to highlight the need for a safer cycling route to school, three live Christmas play performances instead of the usual two, a visit to the Church and Christmas dinner for 85 children at the Village Inn rounded off 2009 nicely.

2010 started later than usual thanks to the weather, but has quickly gathered pace. The children are learning about 'The Victorians' and will end this term with a visit to the 'Gressenhall Workhouse and Museum'.

Our extended schools provision allows for after school club Monday to Friday, helping those parents who work with an alternative childcare option. Numbers have increased year on year. Holiday clubs are run in every holiday period. It is especially pleasing that first year admissions continue to be very strong, proving the school to be a very popular choice, not only for the community but for those out of catchment also.
